## Greenway gives approval to 'Lewiston Public Art Project'

In a brief session Tuesday, the Niagara River Greenway Commission's Host Community Standing Committee gave its endorsement to the "Lewiston Public Art Project," approving \$53,533 in funding toward two-thirds of the Town of

Lewiston application, presented by the Lewiston Council on the Arts.

Maria Fortuna Dean, LCA executive director, outlined the project she described as a component to the Shoreline Trail enhancements in the Village of Lewiston.

"The Village of Lewiston has been working together to make

the most of this extraordinary opportunity," Dean said in her presentation. "The 'Lewiston Public Art Project' connects through Academy Park, which is considered the gateway to our community."

Dean went on to outline what she called "three prongs" of the "Lewiston Public Art Project," which was projected to cost in the \$90,000 range. Included are plans for a four-sided mural at the existing comfort station at Academy Park; a series of artistic benches to be constructed along three Discover Niagara stops on Center Street; and the "Lewiston Living Art Gallery," a series of metal A-frame displays that remains in planning.

Dean said her proposals include funding for the mural project and for the artistic benches, which she said would enhance the aesthetic experience of the village to visitors.

"There is an 8-foot-wide path from the entrance at Academy Park to our mural, which is part of the project around the plaza,

which includes the Visitors Center," she said.

The planned mural is the inspiration of Lewiston artist Maureen Kellick, who created the Greenway trail logo.

"It's painted – a collaborative project. There are painted images" that include scenes of Niagara River orchards vineyards and farmlands on one side of the building; and the use of metal "sculptural components" intended to be "three-dimensional" to the viewer, Dean said.

"Each wall will have a sculptural component to it that will allow for a focus (of the River Region) to visitors. Every wall will provide (them) an opportunity to take pictures" and experience the area.

Dean said the artistic benches are planned for shuttle stops along Academy Park at Ninth and Center streets, at the corner of Fifth and Center streets near the village clock and Northwest Bank, and at Lewiston Landing at Water and Center streets. Dan Butterly is the artist.

"They are artistically designed to complement the existing street aesthetics," Dean said. The bench-

es are envisioned to be cobalt blue in color, reflective of the Niagara River, and would be power coated. "They are not just painted, they are not just metal, so they would withstand the elements and not require upkeep."

As to the third project – the "Lewiston Living Art Gallery" and a series of metal art A-frame displays – Dean said the LCA plans to return for Greenway funding assistance once designs are complete.

"The location and the design have not been finalized (and) approved by the village," she noted.

"Right now, it looks like they're going to be located in Academy Park. They're two-sided frames that can be oriented horizontally or vertically, and we're hoping to have three or four art shows per year with artists from our community, but also bringing in guest artists."

Host Community Standing Committee members went on to approve a total amount of \$53,533 for the "Lewiston Public Art Project." The measure passed unanimously by an 8-0 vote.
