

Much to look forward to in Niagara County

As we head into Memorial Day Weekend and the unofficial start of summer – though you wouldn't know it by some of the weather we have had lately – I wanted to use this week's column to cover several different issues related to the coming months. The better weather always means there is a lot of activity going on in county government.

• First, let me say how important it is to remember the reason for Memorial Day – to honor those who made the ultimate sacrifice defending our freedoms. At a time when pundits everywhere talk about how divided our country is, let's remember there are heroes who gave their lives so we could all have our own opinions and live our lives the way we want.

In honor of those who were killed or injured in battle defending our country, I wanted to let you know ground has been broken on the new Purple Heart monument and courtyard at the Niagara County Courthouse in Lockport. It is anticipated all construction and site work will be ready for our Purple Heart ceremony the first week in

August. I'll have more details on that later this summer.

• Next, I'll use the old joke that there are only two seasons in WNY, winter and road construction. Our Department of Public Works has been preparing for what will be a busy year of repair and maintenance work on county roads and bridges. Over the last several years, we have made great progress in reducing the miles of county roads that are rated as poor or low, while increasing those rated as fair and good. This has been a concerted effort to focus on our infrastructure. Of course, roadwork can mean delays and/or detours for motorists, so I will ask you to please be patient as our crews do their job – and be particularly mindful in work zones.

• Last year, we made significant progress in improving the Niagara County Golf Course in Lockport, and we are excited to

see that progress continue. This year, there are new golf carts for the enjoyment of our golfers, and the course itself is in great shape. Already, we are seeing a lot of new faces at the course. The county course offers a good golfing experience at a reasonable price so, if you have not played it in a while, I encourage you to check it out.

• If you're not into traditional golf, perhaps this is the year to give disc golf a try. I have previously written about the two tremendous disc golf courses we have in Niagara County – Bond Lake at Burmaster Park and Royalton Ravine – both of which are viewed as top courses in the world by the disc golf publication – and that's out of more than 10,000 rated courses.

For those unfamiliar, disc golf is similar to traditional golf, but you are throwing Frisbees into a metal basket rather than hitting a ball into a hole. Our courses, which take players through a beautiful scenic tour of each park, will be hosting some disc golf tournaments this summer.

• Beyond Bond Lake and Royalton Ravine, the county also operates Oppenheim, Krull and

West Canal Marina. Our five-park system is first-class, and I hope everyone will take full advantage of the many amenities we have to offer. You can find splash pads, playgrounds, hiking trails, boat launches, picnic shelters and more. If you have not made your reservation for a picnic shelter, you can still do so at niagaracounty.com under the "Parks Department."

• The better weather also allows us to resume our outdoor career fairs, something that we started during the pandemic and proved to be very popular. The Niagara County Department of Employment and Training will hold an outdoor career fair on Wednesday, June 7, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Oppenheim Park, with 60 companies with open positions signed up to take part.

There continues to be more open jobs than employees to fill them across the county. So, whether you are not currently employed or perhaps looking for a change, the career fair is a chance to see what opportunities are out there that could be the right fit for you. Plus, our WorkSource1 team will be present to provide job seekers with

"We only do one fundraiser a year, the remaining time is spent caring for animals. We also provide educational shows with live animals, and teach how humans can co-exist with nature."
