•**“Summer of ‘69” pre-party** at 6 p.m. Thursday, July 8, at the Lewiston Stone House, 755 Center St., Lewiston. A \$5 admission benefits the Lewiston Council on the Arts.

•**“Summer of ‘69”:** 6 p.m. Friday, July 9. Where were you in the summer of 1969? Tune in, turn on and reunite at the grooviest summer happening of the year. Most of Lewiston’s 1960s rock musicians have moved on, but for one night only they will reunite at Academy Park for an evening of favorites from the ‘60s, ‘70s and ‘80s. Musicians slated to perform include the Lewiston All Stars, Loved Ones, the County Orphanage, the Invaders and special guest Grammy Award winner Gary Baker. For the finale, all players will take the stage for a classic jam.

This free event will take place at Academy Park, at the corner of Center and South Ninth streets.

•**Bug Fest:** Saturday, July 10: group 1: 1-2:15 p.m.; group 2: 2:30-3:45 p.m. Lewiston Council on the Arts teams up with the Lewiston Public Library to present an afternoon of insect-related activities and demonstrations. Watch Chainsaw Chix carve a bookworm bench out of a hunk of wood; listen to a storytelling performance by Karima Amin; or admire a butterfly release. •**“A Tribute to the Edmund Fitzgerald”:** 7 p.m. Friday, Nov.
